	AUG. 1		<p>TRAINING AS PER SYLLABUS.</p> <p>JUST AS WE PASSED THE NORTH OF IRELAND A DENSE FOG DESCENDED AT ABOUT 0700 HOURS. AT 1000 HOURS THE FOG BEGAN TO LIFT AND WE FOUND OURSELVES OPPOSITE THE HAZY OUTLINE OF ARRAN. AS THE MIST FINALLY CLEARED THE WHOLE BEAUTIFUL PANORAMA OF THE FIRTH OF CLYDE UNFOLDED ITSELF. DUTIES WERE DROPPED FOR THE TIME BEING AND EVERYONE MADE THE MOST OF THIS OPPORTUNITY TO SEE A BIT OF THE SCOTTISH LOWLANDS AT THEIR BEST. BY 1300 HOURS WE LAY OFF HELENSBURGH AND BOUROCK. WE HAD EXPECTED TO LAND IMMEDIATELY, BUT THE BOARDING OFFICER DID NOT COME ABOARD UNTIL 1700 HOURS WITH THE INFORMATION THAT WE WOULD NOT DISEMBARK UNTIL THE FOLLOWING DAY.</p> <p>THE NIGHT WAS SPENT PREPARING SHIPS AND REGIMENTAL MOVEMENT ORDERS.</p>	<i>Jas</i>
	2		<p>THE MORNING WAS SPENT IN ROUTINE TRAINING AND THE AFTERNOON IN PREPARING AND PACKING KIT FOR DISEMBARKATION. THE BAGGAGE PARTY HAD MEANWHILE WORKED ALL DAY UNLOADING INTO THE BAGGAGE LIGHTER.</p> <p>BY 1700 HOURS OUR OWN TROOPS BEGAN TO GO OUT ON THE TENDER FROM WHENCE THEY DOCKED AT BOUROCK FOR ENTRAINMENT. LT-COLONEL, AS C.O. TROOPS, AND THE ADJUTANT WERE REQUIRED BY THE E.S.O. TO REMAIN AND PROCEED TO ALDERSHOT ON THE LAST TRAIN. 	3		<p>ALL TRAINS LEFT BOUROCK AT VARIOUS HOURS BEFORE MIDNIGHT, AUGUST 2ND, AND PROCEEDED GENERALLY BY WHAT IS KNOWN AS THE WEST SCOTTISH ROUTE AS DIFFERENTIATED FROM THE CALEDONIAN ROUTE.</p> <p>FROM BOUROCK IN FERFRESHING THE PATH PROCEEDED TO FARLEY, STRATHBUNGE (LANARKSHIRE) KILMARNOCK (AYRSHIRE), THROUGH MUMFRIES (DUNFRIESHIRE) TO ARRAN AND BRETHA JUNCTIONS, CROSSING THE BORDER THENCE TO CARLISLE IN CUMBERLAND. THE C.O. TRAIN ARRIVED IN CARLISLE AT 0340 HOURS WHERE SOME EXERCISE ON THE PLATFORM WAS AVAILABLE, LEAVING AT 0800 HOURS. REFERENCE TO ATTACHED ORDERS WILL SHOW THAT THE C.O. TRAIN WAS COMMANDED BY MAJOR CHOUTE OF THE 13TH FIELD COMPANY, R.C.E.E. WITH LT-COL. HAZARD COMMANDING THE 8TH FIELD AMBULANCE, ALSO ON BOARD AS A BRIGT. COL. HAZARD HAD SAT AT THE C.O. REPORTED ENEMY LIGHT TANKS ON LONG HILL IN OUR REAR. NO CONFIRMATION COULD BE OBTAINED RE THIS, HOWEVER FROM RESERVE AREA. VARIOUS MESSAGES WERE EXCHANGED RE THIS BUT NO CONFIRMATION COULD BE OBTAINED. AT 1704 "B" COY. REPORTED MORE AFVs MOVING FROM BROMHILL, THESE HOWEVER DID NOT APPROPRIATE OUR LINES. AT 1705 "B" COY. REPORTED TANKS ON MATH ROAD THESE WERE ENGAGED BUT A SQUADRON BROKE THROUGH AND PASSED BN. H.Q. AND BN. TRANSPORT WHICH WERE WELL CONCEALED AND PROCEEDED TO OCCUPY OUR TRENCH DUMP. THEY THEN PASSED EAST OUT OF OUR BN. AREA. AT 1723 "B" COY. REPORTED REPULSING ENEMY LIGHT TANKS, EVIDENTLY THOSE REPORTED EARLIER IN BRENTWORTH. MEANWHILE BUNKER WAS COOKED AND SERVED UNDER UNIT ARRANGEMENTS. POSITIONS WERE EVACUATED AT 1900 HOURS WHEN THE EXERCISE FINISHED. IT IS BELIEVED THERE WAS THE THOUGHT ON THE PART OF THE HIGHER COMMAND THAT THE ENEMY ATTACK MIGHT IN FACT BE LAUNCHED ON THIS DAY AND THAT THE EXERCISE WAS AN ADDITIONAL PRECAUTIONARY MEASURE. APPARENTLY THE 138TH SCOTTISH WAS THE ONLY UNIT OF THE MORE NEARLY ARRIVED CANADIANS WHICH TOOK PART IN THIS EXERCISE SO IT WOULD SEEM THAT THIS UNIT WAS IN THE POSSIBLE POSITION OF BEING THE FIRST IN THE 2ND BN. 	16		"H" COY., PART OF "I" COY. AND 1ST REINFORCEMENT COY. LEFT ON LANDINGS LEAVE THIS MORNING. TRAINING GOT UNDERWAY TODAY AS USUAL BUT WAS INTERRUPTED JUST BEFORE NOON BY THE AIR-RAID SIRENS. THIS TIME THE PLANES COULD BE HEARD BUT WERE WELL CONCEALED ABOVE THE CLOUDS. THE DULL THUD OF BOMBS COULD BE HEARD FAR TO THE SOUTH. A SECOND WARNING GAVE IN THE AFTERNOON TOWARDS 1715 HOURS.
