As previously reported the enemy were in considerable strength with crawl trenches and barbed wire entanglements covered by machine gun fire which proved to be a tough proposition as far as 'C' Coy was concerned. 'D' Coy under the command of Major CROPP reached their objective in the edge of HOCHWALD with few casualties - however the going was far from easy. 'C' Coy on the left met very stiff opposition. However, under the outstanding leadership of Major TILSTON they finally secured their objective on the edge of the HOCHWALD to the left of 'D' Coy. Major TILSTON personally replaced the wireless set and brought anno to his men with complete disregard for his own safety. He was wounded once slightly and carried on until he had to be evacuated with a second, more serious, wound in the leg. It was largely due to 'C' Coy Comd's outstanding bravery that the coy was successful. Although they suffered heavy casualties they remained on their objective with the help of the Carrier Pl. After these positions were firm 'A' & 'B' Coys passed through 'D' & 'C' Coys respectively and took up positions beyond in the woods. Their objectives were taken with comparative ease. Inter-unit contact patrols were main- tained during the night as well as a contact patrol from Calgary Highlanders to 'D' Coy. As a result of the day's fight we had taken about 100 prisoners, captured 3 88mm guns, a medium mortar and many automatic weapons. Our own losses were 8 offr and 130 OR casualties.	RWM
