Field	1 SEP 43		The Bn parade originally scheduled for today was postponed until tomorrow. A, B & C coys spent the morning in admin work and in the afternoon held a Sports Parade. D. coy spent the day at the grenade range, Sp coy had trg in combined ops, and HQ coy had battle drill trg at RNAS Boyd range. In the morning three officers, Lt. D. Diesbourg, Lt. P. A. Cropp, and Lt. J. M. Haggans and four ORs from 3 C.I.R.U. arrived at the Unit. The "I" Section spent a profitable day in trg in O.P. procedure in the area north of Hiltingbury Camp. A Small Arms Refresher Course conducted by two Sergeant Instructors from Hythe Small Arms School terminated today. The course was of three days duration and the candidates from this Unit consisted of one offr and two NCOs from each Coy. All report that exceptionally good instruction was obtained and a great deal of benefit should be derived. Throughout the day there was a great deal of debating in the lines as to which coy made the best time on the speed march. B coy claimed they were the best at 2 hrs 5 min, but Major Thomson said the timing for A coy was 1 hr, 58 min, All times were excellent and competition should be keen in the next march.	FF

	3 SEP		<p>trg and street fighting. At 1115 hrs protestant personnel of all coys which were trg in the camp area paraded to the Sports Field to attend a service of thanksgiving, prayer and dedication on this the Fourth Anniversary of the War. The service was in charge of the padre, Capt. J. Cardy, and music was supplied by the Police Force Band from Southampton. At the same time Major Dalton held a service for all R.C. personnel at the "Y" tent. At 1245 hrs the Residue Party consisting of seven offrs and seventy three ORs moved off to their area at Popham. The offr i/c of this party was Capt. T. Ferris. At 1830 hrs a party of fifty ORs i/c of Lt. J.D. Patterson and "Y" Supervisor Cody Moffatt left to attend a social evening including plays, dances and supper at a church hall in Chandler's Ford. At approximately 2230 hrs the party ended with the singing of Auld Lang Syne and the National Anthem. Reports indicate that the evening was much enjoyed.</p>	FT

	9 SEP		Reveille for marching personnel was at 0300 hrs and breakfast at 0430 hrs. The first troops moved off for the embussing point at 0630 hrs, when haversack lunches of 2 buns and chocolate bars were given out. From here they moved to the Transit Area and then to the Hards in Southampton. Marching troops boarded the train at 1330 hrs and arrived back in Halmaker Camp around 1630 hrs. The first craft load of vehicles left Hiltingbury Assembly Area at 1030 hrs, moved to the Transit Area and then the Hards. The first vehicles left for Halmaker about 1600 hrs, arriving back at camp around 1830 hrs. The movement from Assembly Area, through transit area, to the Hards was well carried out and the exercise on this basis might be considered a very successful one. Although a rain greeted us on our return to Halmaker, all personnel were glad to be back after an absence of eighteen days. So ended EXERCISE HARLEQUIN, one of our most profitable periods of trg.
